Evangelism — the language of love

Someone said, “You know that tingly little feeling you get when you fall in love? That’s your common sense leaving your body.” Love is exciting. Caution is thrown to the wind. Inhibitions are overcome. I want to make two simple points about love in this article: love is shared, and love is shown.

First of all, love is shared. The lover wants to tell everyone about his beloved. A professor once asked a group of students if they thought their faith was worth sharing with others. The best answer came from a student who said, “If you are in love, you talk about it, so if you are in love with Jesus, you talk about it.”

In the familiar reading from Acts describing Pentecost, the image of fire is used. It is an image of the Spirit. The Spirit sets Christians on fire with love. It

is not an idea that sets them on fire. Being a Christian is not just accepting an idea. It is being in love. One does not love an idea. One loves a person. Being a Christian is being in love with Jesus.

Furthermore, it is not a set of rules that sets Christians on fire. Being a Christian isn’t simply obeying a set of rules. It is being in love. One does not love rules. One loves a person. Being a Christian is being in love with Jesus.

Of course, the more a person loves, the more zealous that person is to talk about the beloved with others. The more a person loves Jesus, the more he or she will want to talk about Jesus with others.

However, this is not to say being Christian has nothing to do with assent to truth and obedience to the truth. The Gospel says plainly that love of Jesus means obedience to his commandments. This leads to the second point: love is shown. Being a Christian is being in an intense personal

relationship with Jesus, but this relationship is not mere emotion. It is expressed in assenting to the truth about Jesus and obedience to his teaching. Love is not just a feeling; it is an action.

To understand this, we need only think of the example of the love between husband and wife. I don’t mean the initial phases of love, but that deep and abiding love between people who have been married a long time. Maybe she has arthritis. They go to a restaurant. She tells him to open the ketchup for her. He willingly does this, because he loves her. Next time, he may open the ketchup without her having to say anything. Love does not need to have obedience demanded of it, but it gives obedience freely, which is true obedience.

In conclusion, Christians love Jesus, so they talk about Jesus. The one who loves will talk about his or her beloved. Christians will not only talk about Jesus, but their lives will manifest in action their love for Jesus. This is to give a basic, simple, and even spontaneous witness that is nonetheless powerful.

RECIPE

GREEN BEAN DUMPLING SOUP

- 1 bag frozen French Style Green Beans

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 2 cups of flour
- ¼ cup cooking oil
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup cream

The blame game

We were at Home Depot yesterday and my son got in trouble. He was playing with something in the store he shouldn't have been. He told me his sister started playing with it first and then handed it to him. It wasn't fair that he should get in trouble and not her. I told him just to worry about himself, to which he responded, "It's not fair. It's just like Adam and Eve! She starts it and the guy gets in trouble."

The idea of passing the blame is nothing new. As my son stated, it started back with Adam and Eve in the garden. But the fact that it didn't work well for Adam and Eve hasn't stopped any of us from trying it since.

Take the economic challenges our state is facing. Many of the politicians

are so busy trying to place blame (it is an election year after all), that they are not spending much time working on real solutions. And that's what blame does. It takes the focus off possible solutions and puts it into making oneself appear to be better than another person. It must be someone else's fault that you did something stupid, right?

When you blame someone else, you're not taking responsibility for your own actions, and often that's done so that you can mitigate the consequences. If you can blame someone else, then

maybe the judge — whoever that might be in your certain circumstance — will go easy on you. The thinking goes that if it's not your fault, then you shouldn't be punished. While there may be some validity to that line of argument, our default answer to challenges to our

behavior or decisions should not be to blame someone else.

President Harry Truman had a plaque on his desk that read,

"The Buck Stops Here." He recognized the fact that he couldn't pass the blame to anyone else. He had to stop and take responsibility so that problems could actually be addressed and solved. It wasn't about looking good — it was

about being responsible and doing what needed to be done.

I wish more people would take Truman's approach and stop trying to place the blame on others. It didn't work for Adam and Eve, and it's not going to work for us.

Until we recognize the fact that we are responsible for our actions, we won't do anything to change them. If our actions are always someone else's fault, then we don't have to do any of the hard work of being a man or woman of God.

Even in the midst of terrible circumstances, we always have the ability, no, the responsibility to make right choices, regardless of what's going on around us. The buck stops here.

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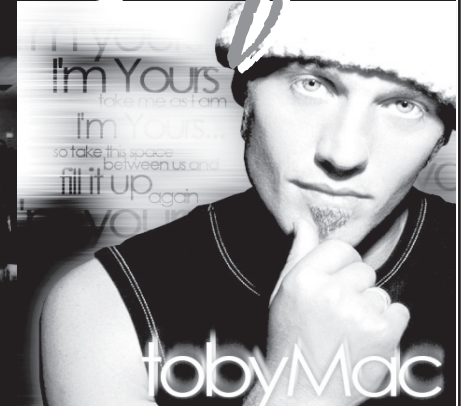
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Take the time to see someone

“Soon afterward, Jesus traveled through the cities and villages, preaching and proclaiming the good news of God’s kingdom. The Twelve were with him, along with some women who had been healed of evil spirits and sicknesses. Among them were Mary Magdalene (from whom seven demons had been thrown out), Joanna (the wife of Herod’s servant Chuza), Susanna, and many others who provided for them out of their resources.” (Luke 8:1-3CEB)

Ευαγγελιζόμενος (yoo-ahn-geh-lee-zah-meh-nahs) is the Greek word that is translated as “proclaiming the good news,” and a word that reminds me of the theme for this month’s issue, evangelism. Evangelism is an interesting word. It is part of the name of the denomination in which I belong to, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). But sometimes I wonder how “evangelical” we as a church are being.

One of the ways that I am evangelical, or share the good news, is by wearing my clerical collar. Now you might be thinking to yourself, what does that funny looking white piece of plastic have to do with being evangelical.

Well, to me, a lot.

The ELCA began ordaining women, acknowledging their call to ministry of word and sacrament, a little more than 40 years ago. But women have been doing ministry for a lot longer than that (see the verses I quoted from Luke previously). I view wearing my collar as evangelical because it helps others to have a conversation with me about their faith. However, sometimes the clerical collar is a hindrance because when people see the collar they clam up and do not talk. I have experienced both of these while around town wearing my collar and at Moka’s Coffee while hosting Free Prayer on Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Feel free to stop on by with a friend.

Now we do not know if Jesus wore a clerical collar; probably not. But Jesus

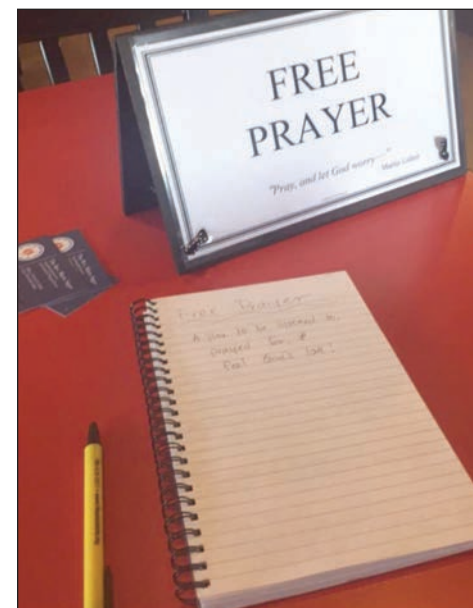
was usually with people who were on the outside, like the woman in the verses right before the ones I quoted from Luke 8. In Luke 7:44, Jesus asks Simon, a Pharisee, whose home Jesus was visiting, if he saw the woman whom Simon stated was a sinner. Jesus says, “Do you see this woman?” This is such a powerful question, and an even more powerful question when thinking of evangelism.

When we (children of God) share the good news about God, do we seek out people that we think need to be “saved” because of some label we gave them? Or do we seek people out to share the good news with because we

know them — we see them for who they are, not just a label. We as Christians, and I include myself in the “we” when I say that, sometimes do not see people beyond the labels we give. Do we see people beyond their convictions, their skin color, who they love, their bank account, or their age? Do we see them for who they are? Each one of us is someone. You are someone!

So go on, see someone. Ask someone about who they are, what they believe. Maybe even invite them to attend church with you. You will never know about someone if you never ask.

'Inspire'd feeling

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes." Romans 1:16 (ESV)

Amber Cunningham has two passions: Sharing her testimony of Christian faith, and helping people improve their health and happiness through physical fitness.

Those two passions converged into one unlikely business in 2011. Cunningham is the owner of Inspire Body Mind Spirit

Fitness, a fitness program that focuses on a person's whole being: physical, mental and spiritual.

"It's just been amazing, the results," Cunningham said. "The weight loss comes because people start getting healthy from the inside out, and we train from the inside out."

Inspire offers a monthly calendar of group classes as well as individualized personal fitness training.

Each workout ends with an optional "quiet time" of reflection, prayer and personal sharing.

Inspire rents gym space at Celebration Community Church. Cunningham, in addition to being a personal trainer, says she has a spiritual gift of evangelism, and just can't help but share the gospel when she has an opportunity.

"Evangelism is one of my giftings that I have," she said. "I love to share Christ with others and show people the freedom there is."

The business, however, is not only for Christians, and clients can choose whether to participate in prayer or Bible studies. Inspire strives to be an accessible and welcoming environment for all, regardless of someone's current health status or personal convictions.

"A lot of people are intimidated to come to the gym," Cunningham said. "We welcome everyone, all fitness levels, and we have ages 15 years old up to 67. We welcome anyone."

The business also offers fitness classes geared toward children.

Some clients choose to come only for physical fitness, and that is perfectly OK, she said. Over the years, however, several people have been touched by the Christian elements of the business.

"We've had a lot of people come out, and they think that they don't need God or maybe they don't understand the whole prayer part, so we've had people ... leave during that time, which is OK," Cunningham said. "Then they find that once they start staying, they realize that's the part they really need. We've had several people who have given their life to Christ and seen amazing things happen."

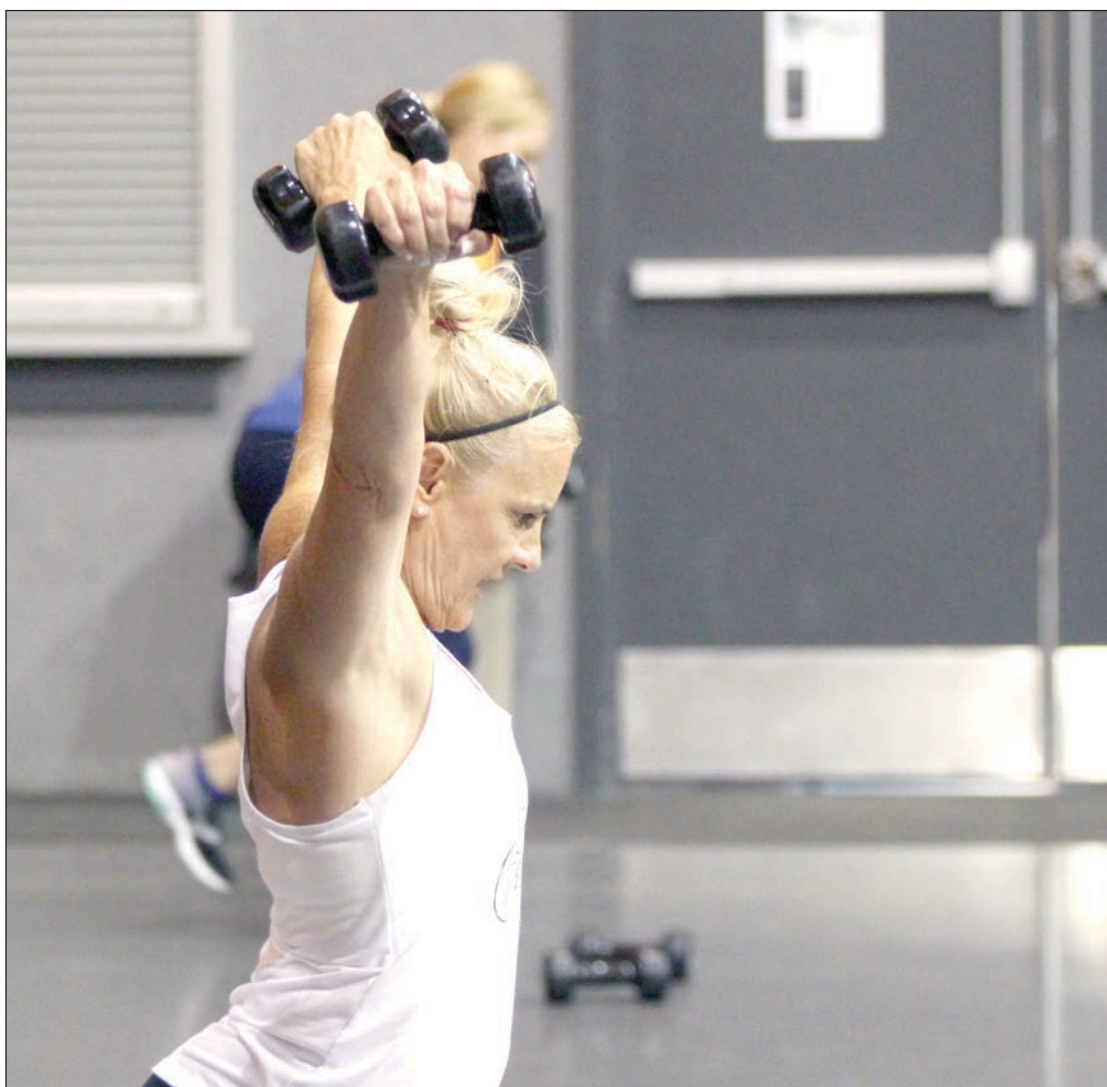
It's also been encouraging to watch friendships bloom as clients begin to share their health journeys — and their lives — with one another. In addition to a Facebook page that promotes the business and posts class schedules, there is a closed group that allows Inspire members to interact with and encourage each other.

"It's a community, where people can come, be authentic, be real and share their struggles. In quiet time, we share our struggles and pray for one another. There's tears," Cunningham said. "But there's also tears of joy too, so we celebrate with one another. It's pretty neat."

Cunningham previously had worked 10 years as a personal trainer at a fitness facility, and loved watching people make positive life changes. But she began to feel a desire to see those transformations happen from the inside out, she said.

"We had people come in completely broken, hurting, and they'd want to talk to somebody," she said. "They needed help, and that's what we're there for. We give people hope and help them get their mind right every day and help them to think positive thoughts.

"If you change your thoughts and words, you can change your life."

Liberty Foursquare Church has moved their Vacation Bible School dates to Aug. 8 to 12. Children age 4 to fourth grade are invited to attend.

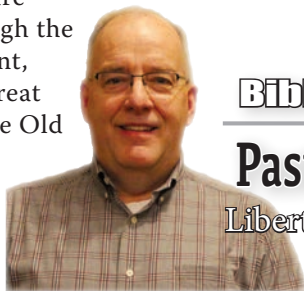
Hays Christian Church is looking for a Praise Team Leader! This
