

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NEWS TO KNOW

The ducks are coming! The ducks are coming! Big Brothers Big Sisters of Ellis County is gearing up for the Hays Duck Derby Race, from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 2, at the Hays Aquatic Park.

The fundraiser will feature 10,000 rubber duckies, each featuring a number, racing down the Lazy River at the park. The race will be split into four heats of 2,500 ducks per heat. The top 250 ducks from each heat will go on to compete in the championship race.

Prizes will be awarded to the first 10 ducks crossing the finish line at the Championship Race. Grand prize is a 2015 Chevrolet Spark. A complete list of prizes is available at www.haysduckderby.net.

Entry fees are as follows: adopting a single duck, \$5; adopting a gaggle (six), \$25; adopting a flock (12 ducks), \$50; adopting a colony (25 ducks), \$100.

Businesses can get in on the fun by entering the Hays 'Merica Cardboard Regatta. Yachts constructed only of cardboard and duct tape may compete in the Soggy Bottom Challenge.

The challenge will consist of four races with 10 boats participating in each race. The winner of each race will be awarded a pizza party for that business and receive five complimentary entries in the Duck Race.

The boat with the fastest time will have the honor of naming the Soggy Bottom Challenge next year. Entry fee in this race is \$500 per business. Participation is limited to the first 40 entries.

Also on the evening's agenda are a Duck Dash for kids ages 12 and under, with brightly colored ducks sold for \$2 each. Each child will get a duck to take home after the race. Prizes will be awarded for the top winners of the Duck Dash.

Free swimming will be offered in the park's zero entry pool starting at 5 p.m. Free kids' games, such as hula-hoop contests and duck waddle races, will keep the kids occupied, and a family picnic featuring grilled hot dogs will commence at 5:30 p.m.

Duck adoptions are available by calling Big Brothers Big Sisters at (785) 625-6672. The organization helps boys and girls, most of whom are considered at-risk and living in single-parent homes, achieve their full potential through long-term personal relationships with carefully screened and caring volunteers.

Over the last 15 years, the organization has matched more than 1,600 at-risk children with adult volunteers. Each year, BBBS of Ellis County matches nearly 204 children with a positive role model.

Working with passion

It started as an obvious solution to a problem, but soon prompted a question Brett and Genell Albert hadn't been prepared for.


The couple was shopping for a new entry table but couldn't find anything in stores that fit their exact measurements and taste. So Brett, who learned woodworking in school, created one — and re-discovered how much he enjoys building. KALEY CONNER, kconner@dailynews.net

"He just kind of threw out the statement that, 'We could do this for people,' " Genell said with a chuckle. "At that time, I gave him a funny look, and that was the end of that conversation.

"It was like a month later we discussed it again, and this time we both agreed that we felt this was a calling on our life."

The Hays couple took their woodworking hobby to the next level in November, and Crossover Restoration was born.

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A custom-made serving tray highlights the "signature" cross of Crossover Restoration.

They create a variety of projects ranging from furniture to wall hangings and home decor — using as much recycled or reclaimed materials as possible.

There is no shortage of reclaimed wood, which the couple collects to have on hand for future projects and customer orders. Their products have a rustic feel to them, and no two pieces are exactly alike due to the variations in wood and reclaimed materials, Brett Albert said.

"I don't always have that much wood of the exact same thing to make them identical," he said. "And I don't work off a set of plans. Most generally, it comes right out of my head."

Their custom projects have included serving trays, dog beds and a variety of wall hangings, the most popular of which is a rustic wooden cross featuring the word "love."

The couple enjoys taking old materials and giving them new life, and they say it draws parallels to their Christian faith. Their faith inspired the name Crossover Restoration, and Genell said the couple looks to 2 Corinthians 5:17 for further inspiration. A small, branded cross is also their signature mark on the pieces they create. "That was confirmation to the beginning of the journey, so that's how we began," Genell said of the scripture. "It was nothing that we expected or planned; I guess those are kind of the best things."

The couple often takes custom-order projects and can do restoration work as well to refurbish old furniture or decorations.

For now, they market exclusively through social media, and their page can be found on Facebook under Crossover Restoration.

The hobby soon outgrew the couple's garage, so they are in the process of build-

ing a new backyard shop that will give them more room to work.

Both have full-time jobs, but enjoy spending time together to pursue the hobby on evenings and weekends. Brett generally does the building and woodworking, and Genell enjoys the detail work of finishing the items.

"It's enjoyable for me, not focusing on the daily grind, but focusing on creating something out of wood or materials that have already been used for something," Brett said.

"We're taking something old and making it new," Genell added.

Message at the Top: My Life Came From Pain

ne of the more difficult realities that people have to work with in life is the fact of pain. Because we are human beings, we will have pain. Sometimes the pain will be extreme, causing people's lives to take on a different direction, as with a physical accident, a disease or the like. Sometimes the pain is not a physical one, such as the psychological

pain of losing a loved one, or the pain of the deliberate mental harm that one causes another. Pain, whether great or slight,

always affects us in some way.

It is likewise a reality that people will react differently to pain. Sometimes the pain will make them bitter people, people who carry a grudge their whole lives, people who will be angry about the way life treats them, and so forth. But for some, pain is a teacher, something that can help us become better people in the long run. Such



is the thought of Imagine Dragons in their song "Believer" when they sing that "My life, my love, my drive came from pain."

"I was broken from a young age, taking my sulking to the masses, writing my po-

ems for the few. They looked at me, took to me, shook to me, feeling me singing from heartache from the pain, take my message from the veins, speaking my lesson from the brain, seeing the beauty through the pain. You made me

a believer; pain, you break me down, you build me up. Let the bullets fly, oh let them rain. My life, my love, my drive, it came from pain."

Such was the belief of Mary, the mother of Jesus, who heard the holy person Simeon describe to her what her life would be. Jesus' father and mother were amazed at what was said about him, and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed" (Luke 2:33-35).

The lesson for people of the 21st century from both the group Imagine Dragons and Simeon the prophet as he spoke to Mary is the important lesson that pain can be a teacher. We can learn the effect that pain and suffering have on us and how we react to it, but most of all, it can help us understand the direction our future lives should go. It might involve real change in our behavior, moving us in a different direction that will enable us to live better.

With pain as the teacher it can be, we will be convinced that pain will always be temporary, eventually disappearing. Then we move on in life. Or, indeed move into eternal life if the pain leads to death.





ONE August 2017 Art a way of 'meeting with the divine'

WICHITA — Theodoros Papadopoulos has painted images of Christ, the Virgin Mary and angels that cover the walls and ceilings of churches.

Those images are not decorations, he says. Rather, they are a way of "meeting with the divine."

"The icon has as its purpose to transport us into the realm of the spiritual experience, to go beyond the material world," said Papadopoulos, a professional iconographer from Greece.

Last week, rather than working on icons for a church in Greece, Papadopoulos has been in Kansas, sharing his knowledge through a workshop held at the Catholic Diocese of Wichita's Spiritual Life Center.

On Friday, Glenn Gunnels looked closely at the canvas in front of him, then at the example of St. Michael the Archangel. Slowly, he painted a few lines — by the nose, on the forehead, around the lips — giving depth to Michael's face.

"I love the spirituality of the icons," Gunnels said. "They're supposed to be a window to the saint you're praying to."

Gunnels and the other students in Papadopoulos' class spent nearly eight hours each day for an entire week working on a single image of Michael.

Sometimes they worked on blending different shades together to create Michael's skin. Sometimes they worked on the sharp, geometric shapes comprising his cloak.

In the end, each had an icon of Michael, his sorrowful face surrounded by a golden halo. Angels never smile in icons, Papadopoulos said, because they aren't human.

An icon is a religious image typically painted on a small wooden panel or the walls and ceiling of a church and used in the devotions of some Christians.

Papadopoulos paints in the style of Byzantine iconography and has created icons to cover the walls and ceilings of at least five churches.

Being an iconographer is not easy, Papadopoulos says. Without assistance, an iconographer easily can spend 15 years working on a single church.

Creating an icon is a deeply spiritual exercise, Papadopoulos said.

"According to the Orthodox church, an iconographer is a medium, and he delivers his mind and his body to the Holy Spirit and the Holy Spirit paints through him," he said.

Icons themselves are full of meaning, Papadopoulos told a group of people who gathered last week for a lecture.

Byzantine icons don't depict shadows caused by sunlight because they are meant to depict the illumination from God's kingdom, which is everywhere.

Geometric shapes are used in the clothing of saints, demonstrating a heavenly order. Sometimes an icon will depict multiple events that occurred at different times, allowable because God is outside of space and time.

Icons also have a lack of depth, welcoming the viewer to "become" the depth, Pap-

adopoulos said. The halo depicted around saints and Christ is a symbol of holiness, and the saints are never shown with a halo in images that take place prior to Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit is said to have descended on Jesus' disciples.

When the Virgin Mary is portrayed, she must have three small stars on her head and shoulders, indicating she was a virgin before, during and after her pregnancy.

Papadopoulos says he is self-taught. He originally painted as a hobby but became interested in icons and began to study them, becoming a professional iconographer about 24 years ago.

The first icon he painted was of Jesus Christ. The second was of John the Baptist. Since the financial crisis hit Greece,

Papadopoulos has been teaching his skills to

others, with workshops around Europe and the United States.

Last year, Mary Grassel created an icon of "Our Lady of the Passion," Mary holding Jesus. That workshop was in Grassel's home state of Wisconsin.

When she heard Papadopoulos would be back in the United States, she decided to fly to Wichita to create another icon.

As she paints, she calls on the saint or other religious figure she's painting for assistance, she said.

"There's just something about them," Grassel said as she took a break from working on Michael's cloak early in the week.

"After you paint an icon, there's something about the eyes that you feel a real connection with who you're painting. You actually start to see into their souls."
