The evening will feature a pre-concert talk at 6:45 p.m. by Paul Laird of the University of Kansas, a trio of composer Aaron Copland's most popular pieces, and a post-concert reception.

Panhellenic holding fundraiser Saturday

The Panhellenic Council at Fort Hays State University is holding a "5K Color Run/Walk" beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 30, at the Memorial Union patio.

Proceeds will benefit the organization's philanthropy, Circle of Sisterhood. Founded in 2010 by sorority women, the non-profit organization raises funds "to help remove education barriers for girls and women facing poverty and oppression," according to the group's website.

Since its founding, the organization has given \$800,000 to groups working in 22 different countries and has funded 12 school builds in Malawi, Senegal, Haiti, Nepal and Nicaragua, the website stated.

Registration for the 5K is \$10 for FHSU students and staff and \$20 for community members.

This year's Festival of Faith will have a new format and a new day. The festival, in its 26th year, will be held from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 4, at the Beach-Schmidt Performing Arts Center.

Nicole Ottley, program director for the Hays Area Chamber of Commerce and a member of the festival planning committee, said the purpose of the festival remains the same: It is an opportunity for Christians of all denominations in Ellis County to come together and celebrate the one thing they all have in common, their faith in Jesus Christ.

She said the planning committee has been meeting since May, and organizers talked with youth pastors and young people themselves to get ideas on how to get youth more involved in the event.

In the past, the event has been held on a Sunday afternoon. The organizers learned that many area churches have family-oriented events on Wednesday nights, Ottley said. By moving the event to a Wednesday night, churches will be able to encourage members to attend the festival as a family.


a catchy tune that

It also was during the time I served as ECMA President that we began a partnership with the City of Hays, Ellis County, the United Way, The Bakery Shop (now The Press) and other area

businesses in the feeding hundreds of people each year at ECMA's Thanksgiving Day Feast. I sincerely believe God's desire is that His people seek out opportunities to build bridges of unity with one another.

Nothing is more valuable to God than his church. He paid the highest price for it, and it is worth protecting. Your responsibility as a believer is to protect the unity where you fellowship and beyond. "Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." Ephesians 4:3

The Bible says that as believers we share one Father, one Spirit, one Lord and Savior. We share one body, one purpose, one hope, one faith, one baptism, and one love. We share the same salvation, the same life, and the same future -- factors far more important than any differences we could have as individual congregations. We as Christ's church should concentrate on what we hold in common and downplay our differences. "Let us concentrate on the things which make for harmony and the growth of our fellowship together." For years I taught in Celebration's membership class these words attributed to Augustine (354-430 AD) over 1500 years ago. "In essentials we have unity, in non-essentials we have liberty but in all things, we show charity (love). Most Christians divide with other Christians not on the essentials but rather on the non-essentials. But in all

One of the mottos of Barton Stone, a founding father of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), an evangelistic church movement that was started on the American frontier in 1809 was, "Let the unity of all Christians be our polar star" I have tried to embrace that ideal ever since entering the ministry over 33 years ago.

As I write this article, the last one I will contribute to ONE before my wife Debbie and I retire to the hills of North Georgia to be closer to our grandkids, I remind you of Jesus' words found in John 13:35

"So now I am giving you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, you should love each other. Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my

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Gallons of help, hope

On Sunday, the church members came. Before them, lined up in the fellowship hall, were 5-gallon buckets, trash bags and cleaning supplies.

No, they weren't coming to clean up the church.

The members of First Presbyterian Church in Hays were ready to begin packing cleanup buckets to send to the victims of three recent deadly hurricanes — Harvey, Irma and Maria.

The church in Hays has joined other churches in the Presbytery of Northwest Kansas in the relief effort. It is part of the response coordinated by the international Presbyterian Disaster Assistance project, said the Rev. Celeste Lasich, pastor of the church in Hays.

The PDA works closely with the Red Cross and other relief agencies on the ground immediately after a natural disaster strikes, she said. In addition to transporting the cleanup kits, PDA teams "are also providing spiritual and psychological assistance" and helping victims with such practical things as how to fill out the mounds of insurance forms.

From Hays, the buckets will be transported to Salina, and then to drop-off points across the storm-ravaged areas "wherever they are needed most." Every day the drop-off sites change, Lasich said, depending upon where the floodwaters have receded enough for relief workers to enter.

The Hays church still is collecting the following new, unopened materials: A 5-gallon bucket with re-sealable lid; one scrub brush; one package of 18 reusable cleaning towels (such as Handi Wipes); one box of dry laundry detergent, 50 to 78 ounces; one bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner, 12 ounces (such as Lysol); one bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap, 24 to 28 ounces (such as Dawn); five dust masks; one package of 48 to 50 clothespins; clotheslines, either two 50-foot lines or one 100-foot line; two pairs of latex gloves (such as Playtex);

one pair of work gloves; one roll of 24 to 28 heavy-duty trash bags, 30 to 45 gallon size (remove from carton); five scouring pads; seven sponges of assorted sizes; one bottle of insect repellant in either pump, drops or lotion — no aerosol cans — 6 to 9 ounce size.

All liquids need to be in plastic bottles. Each bucket has a retail value of \$75. The church has met its initial goal of packing 25 buckets, Lasich said, adding the church is continuing to accept monetary donations, as well as cleaning supplies.

They can be dropped off at the church, 2900 Hall, during normal business hours Monday through Friday.

Lasich emphasized people should not feel that they have to purchase items for an entire bucket.

"Any of these supplies are appreciated," she said.

Lasich said it was quite a sight watching church members pack the buckets in an assembly-line fashion Sunday after church. Because all of the preceding items have to fit into one bucket, there is an exact order as to how the materials must be packed.

"The things we are sending are things they (the hurricane victims) can't even get hold of right now," Lasich said.

One of those on the packing assembly line was Jodi Baumgarn of Hays, who went to Moore, Okla., to assist tornado victims there a few years ago.

She said packing the buckets was "a neat way for people to get involved, even in a small way. It raises awareness," she said, "and makes us mindful of our blessings, and we have so many."

Lasich said the PDA will be sending work crews into the stricken areas in the future, and she expects members of First Presbyterian will go.

PDA teams often stay in an area for years.

"We don't leave until the work is done," she said, adding there still are teams in New Orleans working with victims of Hurricane Katrina, which struck that city in 2005.

VBS BRINGS FUN TO SUMMERTIME

In June this year, **Liberty Foursquare Church** used the Cavequest theme from

The wisdom of the elders and the wonder of children can mesh and together it is SO much more than each thing individually.

FPC-Hays decided to build on that and put it into VBS form! We invited all ages for a three-day "trial" experience. Attendance at all three days was not required. We recognize that summer brings all types of special schedules! ALL ages were welcome. We were pleased to have 28 participants ranging in age from 2-82! We began with a casual dinner, including cross+generational conversations around the tables!

Activities included: storytelling and acting out of scripture, making prayer pails/caddies/journals, listening to children's stories that focused on our targeted scripture, inside "yard" games, and a variety of s'more recipes!

We also enjoyed the debut performance of the Tri-Presby-Ukulelians. Who else can say they have such a thing?

We will definitely be repeating this event next year!

Children at North Oak Community Church learned that the Bible is the "coolest" book on the planet. Stories were shared from the life of Paul, Mary & Martha, the Gospel Message and more. Friday night was a Family Night to share and celebrate what the children learned with a short program, snacks, games, and fellowship afterward.

There were 165 children registered from the nursery through 8th grade. The average daily attendance was 146 children.


The mission project was to raise money for World Shine Ministries in Uganda, Africa. More than \$3,600 was raised with part of the proceeds going to a ministry called, "Happy Feet" to purchase shoes for children that go without. The other portion will go to students who are without uniforms. World Shine will purchase fabric and materials to give to their seamstresses in their tailoring class to make as many uniforms as they can. "For every \$500 raised, the children were able to "Pie a Pastor." They watched a pastor get pied at the closing assembly. From the amount received, we were able to pie the VBS Directors, a teacher, and the mission project leader!

There were 3 children that accepted Jesus as their Savior. North Oak also was able to give 10 Bibles to children that did not have one in their home to read. The church was able to connect with many children that did not have a church home already! It was a wonderful week!

Hays Christian Church had celebrated another fantastic year of Vacation Bible School at the closing program, picnic, and water slide on Sunday, July 16. Many families came to watch the children sing the great VBS songs and hear more about what took place during the week.

This year's theme was Maker Fun Factory by Group Publishing. The focus of the week was teaching kids that God wonderfully and perfectly created them for a purpose. There were games, snacks, Bible lessons, and crafts each night. Teens enjoyed a special teen time each evening, where those 6th through 12th grade students got to dig deeper into the VBS themes. The teens also served the younger children earlier in the evening. It was a great service opportunity for them.

close, she pulls me in enough to keep me guessing. I've been shaking; I love it when you go crazy. You take all my inhibitions: there's nothing holdin' me back."





The format is also changing. The theme for this year's festival is "A Hays Day of Prayer." The Rev. Marie Sager, president of the Ellis County Ministerial Alliance, which is one of the sponsors of the event, said different methods of prayer and praise will be offered at the event.

Ottley said that prayers will be offered on behalf of the nation and government, family and education, business and the media, and the church as a whole.

In addition, individuals from different walks of life will be offering their personal testimonies, Sager said, another new feature of this year's program.

One thing that has not changed about the event is the music, Ottley said. "We are still incorporating different types of music, modern and more traditional."

The event is free and open to the public. A special offering will be taken for the Second Mile Fund, which assists residents of Ellis County, as well as those traveling through the community, who are in need of emergency assistance.


Shoebox gift recipient to speak in Hays
