The holidays are not always jolly for those dealing with empty stomachs and needing help with other necessities--rent, utilities, prescriptions, clothing, etc. This month's issue is divided into three main sections: Food pantries and blessing boxes, organizations providing other types of assistance, and groups offering support for those dealing with grief this holiday season. It is our hope that you will hold onto this month's issue as a resource guide—for you to utilize if need be, or to prayerfully consider which of these ministries you would like to support during this season of giving.

FOOD PANTRIES & BLESSING BOXES

A number of churches in Ellis County offer indoor food pantries or outdoor blessing boxes. The latter are small all-weather structures holding various types of food and hygiene products that are located outside a church.

The following list represents those churches who responded to the Ellis County Ministerial Alliance's request for information, and they are listed in alphabetical order. If we omitted a church offering this type of assistance, we apologize.

This section lists food pantries and blessing boxes available to everyone in the community. Many public and private schools, including Fort Hays State University, have food pantries that are restricted just to their students, faculty, and staff. So they are not included in this list.

First Presbyterian Church 2900 Hall Street

The First Presbyterian

Church is home to a Blessing Box and a Free Little Library. The boxes are located outside near the east driveway to the

church and are open 24/7.

Both were constructed and installed during the stay-athome phase of COVID-19. It

was the church's hope that both would help people meet some of their needs even while maintaining social distance from one another. Their impact was meant to last beyond, as well.

There are no limitations as to who can use either box. Leave what you can and take what you need. The books vary based on what has been left. The church does take book donations so the box can be filled by church members, as well. It is never empty.

The Blessing Box is for nonperishable items. Anyone in the community is welcome to leave items there that they think others could use. It is not limited to food. Personal hygiene items, diapers, wipes, etc., may also be left at the box.

The church also has a ministry called "Go Cart." The congregation adopts a different local mission each month. Individuals bring items for the mission, and those items are then collectively donated.

Groups supported in the past are: Ana's Gift, Westside School, Options Domestic and Sexual Violence Services, Humane Society, USD 489 Food Pantry, Salvation Army, Western Kansas Child Advocacy Center, First Call for Help's Backpacks for Kids, and the Ellis County Ministerial Alliance's Community Thanksgiving Feast.

Hays Christian Church Blessing Box 22nd & Marshall Road

Hays Christian Church operates a Blessing Box outside of our church building at the corner of 22nd and Marshall Road. The box is located on the north side of the building, near 22nd Street. There are a few pavers leading up to the box for greater accessibility from the parking lot.

The Blessing Box is intended to function as a small neighborhood pantry, offering items to those who have a need. Primarily, the box contains shelf-stable food such as peanut butter, baking mix or ingredients,

crackers, cereals (hot and cold), canned foods, and boxed meals.

Sometimes the box will have hygiene products such as toothpaste, shampoo and conditioner, toilet paper, or menstrual products. You may also find seasonal items such as hand warmers or Easter eggs, when appropriate, or fresh vegetables in the summer.

The box is open 24/7 and is refilled semi-regularly by the church. Anyone who needs food or other items is encouraged to stop by and get whatever they might need, no paperwork required. Additionally, anyone who

wishes to contribute to the stock of the Blessing Box may do so simply by dropping by and adding their contributions to the shelves.

Our mission is to provide food to those who are in need in Ellis County. The pantry is open from 9 a.m. to noon the first and third Saturdays of the month. Those in need of food support may come as often as they need to throughout the year.

In 2020, a Diaper Closet was added to our Food Pantry service, so anyone in our county who is in need of diaper support is also welcome.

St. Joseph's Food Pantry opened its doors in January of 2001 and continues into its 21st year of helping our community by means of a very simple check-in process.

OTHER TYPES OF ASSISTANCE

A number of organizations in Ellis County provide a broad range of services. These can include help with rent, utilities, prescriptions, clothing, and lodging. Some also offer food, and one local business offers free meals at certain times each month.

Some of the organizations listed below have set income guidelines for recipients; some don't. They all share one common goal—to provide loving care and assistance to the people of Ellis County. They are listed in alphabetical order.

Breathe Coffeehouse 703B Main Street

Breathe Coffeehouse hosts a free Community Meal every second and fourth Sunday from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. Join us for a home cooked meal and good conversation. It's a great way to make connections and share life and a meal with people in our community.

Our goal is to create an environment where people who care can serve or just engage in a meal with others. We know that people

need more than food, and we believe in being intentional in loving our community. Jesus gave us the example of breaking bread with others, and we believe we can improve our community through the simple act of having a meal together and talking.

Breathe has another opportunity for people to be able to connect and care for one another. Can We Just Talk? meets every Thursday night at Breathe. Our goal is to

open up with other people to share in each other's struggles.

Whether you come from a place of need or because you want to be there for others, we know that talking can make a difference. We all can make an impact if we are willing to commit to talking. We all struggle . . . talking helps.

Breathe Coffeehouse is open from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday; it is closed on Sundays.

Community Assistance Center 208 East 12th Street

The Community Assistance Center provides support for our brothers and sisters in need. It affords an organized way for individuals to share with or to receive assistance from the community.

We assist Ellis County families or individuals of low or no income, transients, the homeless, those who are disabled, the elderly, and disaster victims with food, clothing, household items, and furniture. We provide aid not only in times of crisis but throughout the year.

In order to receive assistance, recipients must meet the low-income guidelines and live in Ellis County. Potential recipients may apply at the center during business hours. The center is open from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. Please call (785) 625-9110 before arriving so we may inform you as to what documents you will need to provide the center before receiving services.

Clients may receive food boxes six times in a 12-month period. They may shop monthly for clothing and household items. We also provide furniture items at no cost, depending on what is available.

Christmas food baskets may be requested by any Ellis County resident who meets our income guidelines. Signup is Oct. 1 through Nov. 12.

The Community Assistance Center is an incorporated, non-profit organization. The CAC receives no funding from federal, state, or county agencies. At this time, all funding is derived from private and charitable sources.

To help with operating expenses, the Community Assistance Center has garage sales the first and third Tuesdays of each month from

8 to 11 a.m. The public is invited. An added benefit of the garage sales is that they provide an economical source of clothing and household items for the community at large.

First Call for Help of Ellis County 607 East 13th Street

First Call for Help of Ellis County was created through the work of pastors and community leaders who were called on for emergency financial help. The group wanted to reduce duplication of requests and centralize the services that were provided.

First Call for Help offers crisis assistance to Ellis County residents and transients who are struggling to meet their basic needs. The funding for financial assistance is provided by the Ellis County Ministerial Alliance through its Second Mile Fund.

Emergency financial assistance for rent and utilities is available at First Call, as are hygiene items, diapers, and food, all donated by the community. As staff members work with clients, they discuss budgeting and prioritizing

needs so that future financial assistance may not be needed.

The transient assistance program is designed to assist travelers who are stranded in Hays. Fuel vouchers, bus vouchers and occasionally lodging are provided. First Call for Help also serves as a referral agency to inform and connect people to additional resources in the community.

There are three other programs that benefit the community in a different way:

Backpacks for Kids is a free annual school supply and backpack collection distributed to students in August.

Meals on Wheels are delivered every day by volunteers who pick up the meals at Hays Medical Center and take them to elderly, disabled or homebound individuals. There is a cost involved with this program.

First Step Housing is a transitional housing program

for local residents who are either homeless or being evicted. The focus of this free program is not only to house participants but to help them accomplish goals of working, saving, budgeting and ultimately moving into a place of their own.

First Call for Help of Ellis County is open 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Requests for financial assistance require an appointment, and the phone number is (785) 623-2800. Monetary donations are always welcome at the above address.

In addition, three different programs are also available-the Paper Pantry, Project

These programs and

The Paper Pantry is available to low-income individuals and families who are needing personal hygiene products and cleaning supplies. The Paper Pantry is open from 10 a.m. to noon Tuesdays and 1 to 3 p.m. Thursdays at the above location.

Project Suitcase addresses the needs of children in the foster care system. The children are given hope and dignity with a new suitcase filled with socks, shampoo, a blanket, and other items to help them with the transition of going into foster care.

The Christmas season is made special for clients with the Angel Tree Gift Program, which provides Christmas gifts for children in need.

The Angel Tree sign-up forms are available at the Salvation Army office.
Families have until Nov. 23 to apply. After eligible families offer gift ideas for their children, these requests are

Donors are asked to take a

Unite Ministry also oversees distributions of commodities from the Federal Emergency Assistance Program. Unlike the free store that anyone can use, this commodity program requires recipients to earn 130 percent of the federal poverty level or less, and the commodities are distributed at set times.

Full details (including income guidelines and schedule) can be found at UniteHays.com (just click the Hays Commodity Distribution Tab on the website). Besides these direct

assistance programs, we also offer small group Bible studies that are attended by individuals from different denominations and sometimes different belief systems altogether.
