Secondly, we must look for what God is doing and join Him in that! The word "perceive" means to: "become aware or conscious of something; come to realize or understand." The Message translation puts it this way: "Be alert. Be present." How exciting for us to be able to join Him in what He's doing! This may be something on a

global scale. Maybe it's something in your family. Maybe it's with a co-worker or a classmate. Maybe it's even in your own personal life. Wherever He's working and whatever He's doing - we need to be aware of that, be present in that situation, and join Him in that.

Lastly, we have to trust God that He will make a way! In that situation that seems hopeless, and there is no solution you can see. In your marriage, where it seems that there is no peace or love. Or maybe it's the start of a new career, a move to a new city or a new relationship. Whatever it may be, He WILL make a way. He WILL lead you through the "wilderness" and through the "wasteland" on to what He has for you in a new beginning!

I close with another encouraging word from the Bible. I recently saw this posted on Facebook, "The new thing that God seeks often occurs in times of disruption, when the familiar world has collapsed and the future is in doubt, when the days grow shorter, and we wonder if darkness will swallow the light... God's new thing is a vision of 'something more,' a hovering possibility that challenges the world as it is."

The quote is attributed to The Work of Christmas: The 12 Days of Christmas with Howard Thurman by Bruce Epperly. Those twelve days of Christmas end on Epiphany, the arrival of the Magi. This season of Epiphany is all about light. We have come through the darkness of winter, we've passed the darkest day of the year, December 21, and we get a bit more of that bright light each day.

In 2021, this hopeful season is coming at a time when "the familiar world has collapsed." When we were closing schools for an extra bit of Spring Break last March, most of us never dreamed we'd still be using Zoom for Worship, considering Communion a risk, and living with all the other "new normal" activities almost a year later.

Our world has been ravaged by COVID-19. Many of us did not celebrate the holidays in our traditional

ways; we missed first steps, final hugs, and more-and we are stepping into this new year without 1.67 million (as of this writing) of our friends, neighbors, and loved ones the world over. Our front-line workers are exhausted at new levels; all that family time we used to crave is wearing thin after months of shelter-inplace orders, quarantines, homeschooling, etc., and the loneliness of our most vulnerable neighbors is at a desperate level. To put it plainly, we are weary.

Matthew 11:28-30 says, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." One way God has taught us to

make our burdens light is to help each other.

One of my favorite pre-COVID activities was singing in a choir. The Smoky Hill Chorale is not meeting right now, and we aren't doing any corporate singing at Trinity yet; however, my experience singing helps me lean into an analogy about helping our neighbors. When singing in a choir, sometimes you have to stop to take a breath, but those around you are there to carry the tune until you can rejoin. If you are feeling weary, take a break, and let God give you rest. If you are renewed and restored, help carry the tune so your neighbor can rest. That might look like picking up groceries for a friend who's quarantined, posting a positive message in your window, leaving a special note or treat for your mail

carrier, donating food or money to those who are struggling right now, sending cards or calling loved ones, or making masks for your local hospital or shelter.

In this time of COVID, when we cannot always lift each other's burdens in the same ways we used to, there is still help to be given, spirts to be lifted, and renewal to be found. This pandemic is awful. BUT, God is doing amazing things-even in the midst of this pandemic. There are vaccines coming, and while all aspects of our "new normal" will not be going away, we can embrace these necessary changes, find joy in small moments, rest when we need it, and do our part to make this Epiphany and all of 2021 a hopeful, joy-filled, new beginning.

and complete, not lacking anything."

Though this process is real for those in whom the Holy Spirit is working, it often takes us relying on the Holy Spirit to get through the process and for us to see the process in this light. Without the Holy Spirit's help, spiritual growth processes often just look like the problems and trials that the Bible verses mention. I find the same is true for me with physical exercise. Even knowing the goal and the reasons, day one of any fairly serious workout routine after a time of not working out is very uncomfortable. In reality though the process creates better overall physical health, it often even involves shortterm damage in terms of micro-tears in my muscles and exhausting body resources. Eventually, the fruit of this physical training becomes visible as I end up healthier and with better physical capabilities than I had before. I feel that will be

the case for many of us spiritually due to last year's growth phase.

For those of us who have experienced such growth, as things change and the new year begins to flow differently than the previous, it is a time to double-down and listen to the Holy Spirit with great anticipation and excitement. My human nature will tempt me on both sides of the spectrum-both to excessive rest and recreation that will be newly available and to getting overly committed with work that I am again able to engage in. Both of those things in moderation are fine, but in excess will turn into the weeds that choke out the spiritual harvest that Jesus mentions in Matthew 13:22.

Instead of immediately becoming distracted by the worries and cares of this world, I want to listen to see how the Holy Spirit wants to continue this growth and to use some of this newfound

spiritual strength to further the Kingdom. The exciting thing is that only He knows how this will play out for each of us specifically.

I am confident we will have opportunities to use our talents and to invest them for the good of all (Matthew 25:14-29). Regardless of what form this takes for each of us individually, we as believers are blessed to be able to walk forward in our hope and joy, and I sincerely pray that this joy radiates out to touch the world around us. In truth, the biggest time for this hope and joy to stand out has been during this time of growth and struggle, as even very worldly individuals will feel hope from things returning to a more normal pattern. It is my personal hope that even then we can come alongside the hope and joy that even nonbelievers will likely feel to point others back to the true source of hope and joy-Christ himself.
